HUM 2020: Introduction to Humanities

Dr. Elijah Pritchett (Lee campus or Live Flex)

From Michaelangelo's David to the feminine Medusa, from Saluti's muscle-bound Hercules to Gentileschi's defiant Judith, this course will explore how Renaissance thinkers and artists forgrounded and played with images of gender, exaggerating them into mythic and sometimes even monstrous dimensions within their paintings, sculptures, architecture, writing and music.

This section of humanities will be a survey of the arts using gender depiction in the Renaissance as its special focus, and the art, architecture, and literature of the city of Florence as its primary material.

LIT 2000: Introduction to Literature Florence's Literary Past and Present

Dr. Scott Ortolano (Lee campus or Live Flex)

Come escape from plagues in the hills of Fiesole with Boccaccio, descend into hell with Dante, conspire with the Medici, adventure with Casanova, love Florence through the eyes of visiting writers, refashion the world with Italian Futurists, and revel in the absurd with Italo Calvino. Think about how we are shaped by the artistic and intellectual legacies we inherit, and use that knowledge to discover more about yourself than you ever imagined! This course will chart the literary legacy of Florence from the time of antiquity to the Futurist movement of the early 20th century and the post-modern legacy erected in its wake.

IDS 2891: CREATIVE Capstone:

Explorations and Adventures in Italian Culture

Dr. Alessandro Cesarano (Lee campus or Live Flex)

Cultural awareness and cultural competencies are essential in today's world. This course will explore the interconnections of Italian history, art, music, architecture, language and more.

Students will go beyond the typical tourist attractions and dive deeper into Italian culture. This course constitutes a culminating General Education experience focused on applied transdisciplinary learning.

Assisted by classmates, professors, and librarians, students will design and execute a significant project that addresses complex real-world issues.
